It was stated in the notice to depositors that the present condition of the money market does not justify the investment of demand funds which may be called for at any moment.

**Wholesale Business Good**—Business was good on wholesale row early this week, Christmas trade developing early in the week and continuing with a rush right up to the last minute. Supplies were plentiful and the demand good. Green stuffs, vegetables and fruit sold well, but cranberries could not keep pace with the demand and petered out early. Celery, tomatoes and hothouse green onions were much wanted and sweet potatoes were sold in large lots.

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**HINDOO IS CHARGED WITH CARRYING ARMS**  
**Baboo Singh in Jail as Aftermath of Quarrel Between Rival Factions.**  
 Charged with having two loaded revolvers in his possession, Baboo Singh, who has figured in several cases in court recently, was arrested by Police Constable Creighton last night on the Granville Street bridge. He was lodged in jail and will be brought to trial on Monday.  
 According to the story of the officer, a group of Hindoos were fighting on the bridge near Fourth avenue. He interfered, and finding the guns on the accused, took him in charge. It is alleged by the other Hindoos that he had quarrelled with Jagat Singh and Hari Singh. He is said to have asked Hari Singh if he would have given evidence for the defence in the case of Sohan Lal, who was charged with inciting the murder of Inspector Hopkinson. Hari Singh replied in the affirmative, whereupon the accused is alleged to have struck him. Jagat Singh interfered and was also struck by the accused. Other Hindoos crowded in and the accused is alleged to have drawn the guns. It is understood that a white man witnessed the affair and the police are seeking him as a witness.
