HOW SIND RECEIVED THE NEWS.

Karachi, Nov. 4.
The news of the outbreak of war between Turkey and Great Britain has been received quietly in the province of Sind.

LOYALTY MEETING AT RANGOON.

Rangoon, Nov. 4.
Mr. A K A S Jamsi presided at a meeting of the Mahomedan community, Rangoon, held at Fytche Square this evening, which was attended by over eight thousand Mahomedans. Resolution was passed, expressing their deep regret at the outbreak of the war with Turkey asking every Mahomedan in duty bound to remain loyal to the British Crown and urging all to discredit all unauthenticated news and refrain from any action speech or expression of opinion which was apprehensive of any mischief or cause even of the least anxiety to their lot. Another resolution was passed forwarding copies of the above resolution to the Indian and Burman Government and to the Press.

LOYAL RESOLUTIONS.

Lucknow, Nov. 4.
The Council of the All-India Moslem League adopted the following resolutions and wired to His Excellency the Viceroy:—

(1) The Council of All-India Moslem League gives expression once more to the deep-rooted loyalty and sincere devotion of the Muslims of India to the British Crown and assures His Excellency the Viceroy that the participation of Turkey in the present war does not and cannot affect that loyalty and devotion in the least degree and the Council is confident that the Muslims in India will avert their eyes to a hair's breadth from his Government duty to his Sovereign.

(2) The Council of All-India Moslem League expresses its deep gratitude to the British Government for the assistance given to its Muslim subjects in the emergency of holy places of Islam and other places from which they have been driven and for the assistance rendered from its

SIKHS AT VANCOUVER.

EXTRAORDINARY SEQUENCE OF TRAGEDIES.

PUNJAB GOVERNMENT "COMMUNIQUE."

Lahore, Nov. 4.
The following press "Communique" has been issued by the Punjab Government:—

About a month after the "Koma-gata Maru" left Vancouver, quarrels which had been seething for a long time past among the local Sikhs, resulted in violent tragedies. In the middle of August a Sikh named Harnam Singh son of Nihal Singh of Gaipat, Patiala disappeared and on 31st August his dead body was found in a bush with throat cut. Inquest resulted in an open verdict but the friends of the deceased suspected murder. Two days later, Arjan Singh a friend of the deceased Harnam Singh, who had shown much grief for the death of his friend was shot by a member of the Sikh Temple Committee of Vancouver. Four eye witnesses to this shot stated that it was accidental. These tragic events apparently preyed on the mind of one Bala Singh, an interpreter of Canadian Immigration Department, who after attending the cremation of his friend Arjan Singh appears to have run amok in the Sikh Temple at Vancouver where he suddenly produced two revolvers and fired right and left into the congregation wounding eight Sikhs of whom two died. The names of the latter were Bhag Singh and Badan Singh, while those wounded were Uttam Singh, Dalip Singh and Sohan Lal. Apparently this extraordinary sequence of tragedies did not even stop there as about a week ago, Reuter's telegram announced the murder by an Indian of Inspector Hopkinson of the Immigration Department in the Court House, Vancouver.
