Sir,

We beg to inform you that you send water four or five tons a day, and the boatmen, who bring water, speak always about four or five tons, but when the Officers on Board measure it, they find two or two and a half tons only. We don't know where does the remaining water go away. You try to find out from boatmen to prove it that who is right and wrong. This quantity of water you send every day, is not sufficient for one meal only.

It is required 6 tons for one meal and for all the day long 15 tons are sufficient.

It is also required 6 tons to steam and light. There is no light all the night long from three days, which is very difficult for the passengers on board, without light.

We have reminded you to have butter and other things on board many times; but about these no answer received yet.

Every day 50 lbs butter, is spent to make the dinner, which is very essential for dinner, without it we can't make meals and vegetables &c.

The flour you sent is not good to eat, passengers are feeling sick to eat this kind of flour.

There is a need of doctor to inspect the passengers every day, because, on account of past day's hunger & thirst, passengers are going to be sick more and more.

It is only your duty to provide the passengers with every kind of necessity, because, you have kept the passengers prisoners.

We request you, that you please send 15 tons water, butter and remaining things, whose list has been sent to you before, as soon as possible, on account of butter, our meals are useless to cook.
