

Tuesday morning, July 21, 1914.

Arrived at office 6 A. M. in company with Mr. Hopkinson and Mr. Gwyther. Mr. Reid arrive a little later. All necessary arrangements were completed awaiting arrival of Rainbow. About 7:30 Chief of Police and militia officers and Magistrate arrived. Word received 7:30 that Rainbow would drop anchor about 8:15, which she did. Immediately following went aboard:

and other officials, in the tug Sea Lion.

Held conference in the cabin with Commander Hose. Commander Hose seemed well informed on the whole situation and advised us of his plans, viz., to run alongside the Komagata Maru and drop three gangplanks, on board the poop, the bridge and the forecastle. He had two fire hose ready at each gangplank, to be used if the Hindus refused to allow militia aboard ship. Marines and militia were to board with fixed bayonets. Hose was to be freely used in effort to subdue them without injury. He further planned to drive them in small batches aboard the Rainbow, where they would be made prisoners.

Prior to making any attack, the conference agreed with my suggestion to make a final effort to placate the Hindus by getting a committee of shore Hindus if possible to confer together with the official interpreters of the Department.

We came ashore and got together a committee of four Hindus and asked Sohan Lal to join. He refused to do so

and this Committee then refused to assist. A further suggestion was made that Rahim Singh be allowed to confer with the Hindus on board ship. This we at once conceded, and asked that Rahim and his Committee should come at once to hold this conference. Every effort is to be made to conciliate the Hindus and make them every reasonable offer in the matter.

This was about 9:30 and up to 11:30 no definite action had been taken by the shore Hindus to comply with our offers.

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
