THE RIOT AT BUDGE BUDGE.

ARRESTS OF THE RUNAWAYS.

CALCUTTA, 1ST OCTOBER.

The Sikhs arrested in connection with the Budge Budge riots number 120. Of these 16 were killed and the others are either in hospital or under arrest. There were five casualties on the other side.

Superintendent Eastwood is reported to be doing well.

The local press comments severely on the conduct of the Komagata Maru passengers, which no one will repudiate more heartily than the Sikh race, who have recently shown their striking loyalty in time of war.

The Bengal Government have issued the following statement:—The number of Sikhs now accounted for is nearly 120, sixteen killed and the remainder arrested or in hospital.

Mr. Lomax and four Indians were also killed.

2ND OCTOBER.

The number of emigrants brought to the Hooghly on the Komagata Maru was about 320. Of these sixty went off by train to their destination. The authorities are searching for the rest in order to bring them into safety. A sentry on patrol duty in connection with the search while crossing the E. B. S. Railway bridge over South Russa-road was knocked down by a passing train. His injuries necessitated his removal to hospital.

5th October.

Chandan-Singh, a Komagata Maru emigrant who had managed to elude the police so far, was arrested at Sealdah station this morning. The man was placed before the Police Magistrate of Sealdah who transferred the case to the Alipore Magistrate.

Five more emigrants who were arrested in the Howrah district have been conveyed to the Alipore jail.

REPORTED BRUSH WITH TROOPS.

5TH OCTOBER.

Official information having been received by the District Police, Hughly, that about 80 Sikhs in two batches proceeded through the Sheakhala Chanditala road towards Arrambagh on Thursday, a special with about 50 troops proceeded to Tarakeswar. Mr. M. L. Cassey, Assistant Superintendent of Police, Serampore was present at Tarakeswar. The troops proceeded towards Arrambagh and at Sodepur at night they found some Sikhs sleeping in a meadow surrounded by tanks. The troops roused the Sikhs who, it is alleged, opened fire and then attempted to escape. Before they could do so 17 of them were, it is stated, subsequently arrested at village Purusara near Arrambagh.

6TH OCTOBER.

Out of 321 passengers of the Komagata Maru only 85 are now evading arrest. Of the others 60 went quietly to their homes in the first special train and the remainder, except those already mentioned as casualties, are under arrest.

In addition to the arrests already reported one clever arrest was made on Monday evening by the Railway Police at Bally Station. The Sikh in question, who refuses to give his name, had his hair cropped short, his beard shaved off and wore a Bengali saree. He was inducing a passenger to buy him a short journey ticket when he was arrested. The man was sent to Alipore Jail.

Two more arrests have been made in the Hooghly district.

Five were arrested at Goalundo Station on the 2nd instant. On the same date two were taken at Barrackpore and two at Ischapore.

One was arrested this morning at Baranagore.

MIDNAPORE, 6TH OCTOBER.

One of the stray Punjabees of the Komagata Maru gang, it is reported, has been traced near Chandrakona road station in thana Salboni of this district. He had a revolver with him and eluded arrest. He has, however, since been taken into custody. The police, are very vigilant and money rewards of Rs. 100 have been proclaimed by beat of drum for each arrest.

THE VICTIMS.

CALCUTTA, 2ND OCTOBER.

The funeral of the late Mr. Malcolm Major Lomax, District Loco Superintendent, Eastern Bengal State Railway, who was shot on Tuesday night in the riot at Budge Budge, took place in the Lower Circular Road Cemetery last evening. Mr. Lomax was a Lieutenant in the Eastern Bengal State Railway Volunteer Rifles and was buried with full military honours. Mr. Lomax leaves a wife and two children.

3RD OCTOBER.

Mr. J. H. Eastwood, Superintendent of the Calcutta Reserve Police, who was wounded during the riot at Budge Budge on Tuesday last, died at the Presidency General Hospital at about eight o'clock this morning, the immediate cause of his death being internal hemorrhage.

The deceased was, until a late hour yesterday evening, apparently as well as could be expected, but serious symptoms set in during the early hours of this morning. Although hopes had been entertained of his recovery and one of the bullets had been extracted, it was found impossible to locate the others in time to prevent a fatal termination.

Mr. Eastwood, who was Sergeant-Major in the Rifle Brigade, joined the Calcutta Police on the 10th November, 1910, as Inspector and within six months was appointed Superintendent of the Reserve Force. He was born in 1864 and was at the time of his death only two days above 50 years of age. He enlisted in the Rifle Brigade in 1886 and rose to be Sergeant-Major. He saw much service and was awarded the following decorations:—Medal for long service and good conduct; 1905; Sudan medal, 1898; medal for distinguished conduct in the field; the clasp for the Nile expedition,

1898; The South African medal and clasps for the Tugela heights, the relief of Lady Smith, Laing's Nek and Belfast, 1901-1902. Mr. Eastwood leaves a widow, two sons and three daughters. One of his sons is a private in the Rifle Brigade and is now at the front.

In all the engagements which Mr. Eastwood had been through he was not hit on a single occasion and it appears to be hard that he should have come by his death in an unimportant riot. Mr. Eastwood was a typical soldier and although a strict disciplinarian was loved and respected by his subordinate staff.

The funeral, which will be a military one, will take place at 8 o'clock to-morrow morning at the military cemetery, Bhowanipur.

4TH OCTOBER.

The funeral of the late Superintendent Eastwood took place at the military cemetery to-day and was attended by over 2,000 people. The procession, which started from the General Hospital at 9.30 a. m., was headed by a firing party with reversed arms and the drum and fife band from the Royal Fusiliers. The coffin was mounted on a gun carriage and covered by a Union Jack, on which rested the deceased's helmet and gear. The Superintendent's charger bearing his boots reversed in the stirrups, was followed by a carriage in which was Mrs. Eastwood and her two daughters.

The procession was composed of one squadron of the Calcutta Light Horse, the Cyclists, "F" and Second Companies of the C. V. R., one company of the Royal Fusiliers, European police sergeants and two companies of native police.

Amongst those in the cemetery were Sir William Duke, the Hon. Mr. J. G. Cumming, Mr. R. B. Hughes-Buller (Inspector-General of Police), and Sir F. Halliday. The last named was carried in a chair on account of the injury to his foot sustained at Budge Budge.

A number of warrant officers from the Fort also attended.

The burial service was read by the Rev. S. S. Scott, Garrison Chaplain.

Twice a volley salute was fired over the grave and the Last Post was sounded.

LAHORE, 5TH OCTOBER.

Sikhs, assembled in a mass meeting at the Golden Temple, Amritsar, under the presidency of Mr. S. V. Arur Singh, C.I.E., expressed regret at the sad incident, which occurred at Budge Budge (Calcutta) and begged to bring to the notice of Government that they dissociated themselves from the rioters' action and reassured Government of their unflinching loyalty and devotion to the British Crown.

The chief mourners were the sons and daughter of the deceased officer.

SIMLA, 3RD OCTOBER.

Information has been received that the following members of the Punjab Police were killed or injured in the riot near Calcutta by the Komagata Maru passengers:—

Head Constable Mal Singh and Constable Faun Singh were shot dead and Constables (1) Hari Singh, (2) Ibrahim, (3) Ali Baksh and (4) Bhagwan Das were wounded.

THE RELIEF FUNDS.

SIMLA, 2ND OCTOBER.

An Indian Army order announces the
opening of a patriotic fund for the relief
of British and Indian soldiers and followers
who are killed or who die from the effect
of wounds received or sickness contracted on
active service. There will be a Central Commit-
tee including the Secretary to the Government
of India, Army Department, the Adjutant
General and the Military Accountant-General,
with branch committees in each brigade area,
to investigate applications and distribute
relief.

THE DISTRIBUTION OF RELIEF.

CALCUTTA, 2ND OCTOBER.

A Press communique states that Rs. 5,000
has been placed at the disposal of the District
Charitable Society, Calcutta, by the
Executive Committee of the Bengal
Branch of the Imperial Indian Relief
Fund for relieving the distress caused
directly by the War amongst the European
and Anglo-Indian community residing in
Calcutta and the districts of Howrah
and the 24 Parganas, and amongst the
Indian community residing in Calcutta
alone.
