Nursing bursary in memory of Mayo, Saroya

A memorial bursary in the names of Cowichan Valley pioneer, Mayo Singh and his daughter Joginder Kour Mayo Saroya, has been established for UVIC nursing students.

The annual \$250 bursary was sponsored by Mayo Singh's son-in-law, Joe Saroya, and grandchildren, Ranjeet and Mark.

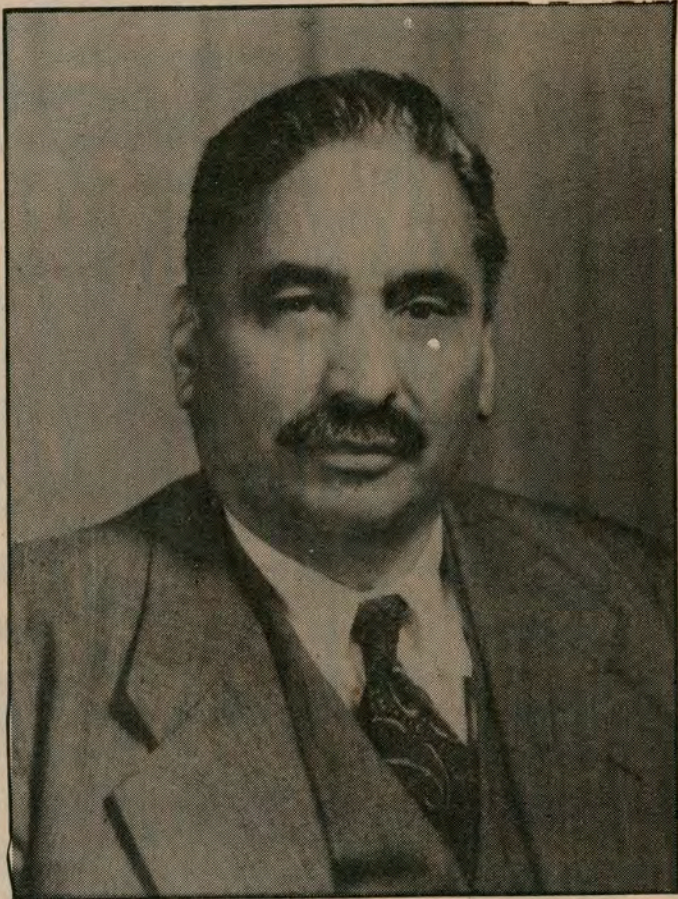
Singh died in 1955 and his daughter died Sept. 16, 1982.

The Mayo Singh -Joginder Kour Mayo Saroya Memorial Bursary will be awarded each year for the next ten years, to a needy student of the UVIC School of Nursing.

Singh, president and founder of the Mayo and Kapoor Lumber companies, was a frequent and generous benefactor of schools and hospitals on Vancouver Island. His daughter was a long time member of the

Cowichan District Hospital Senior Auxiliary.

Both made their homes in the Valley.

N. Cowichan stalls on EDC pull-out

North Cowichan council set aside debate on its controversial proposal to pull out of the Economic Development Commission until after a planned Jan. 10 meeting with EDC members.

Council's lands management and development committee chairman Ald. Ron McKinnon had plann-

ed to begin debate on his proposal to withdraw from the agency, then asked to set the matter aside until he could meet with the EDC.

McKinnon's proposals were not voted on when he raised them at the last council meeting so Ald. Rex Hollett, an EDC member and supporter, could be on hand to offer his side of the debate. Hollett was present Jan. 4, but will be on holiday when council meets Jan.
