

[Health requirement form for the applicants to Stanford University]

STANFORD UNIVERSITY
HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR ADMISSION

TO THE STUDENT:

A HEALTH EXAMINATION is required of all students when they first enroll in Stanford University and they may be required for health reasons. This examination is given by the University in the Student Health Service and is essential to the completion of registration in the University. This regulation applies to all students—undergraduate, graduate, and medical. Four students registering in the autumn quarter will receive notices in advance concerning application for their health examination. Others must make arrangements with the Health Service for an examination before their registration is complete.

VACCINATION CERTIFICATE: You have three days after the day of registration every student must fill out the Certificate (See the Certificate on page 1000) a certificate, signed by the physician, who must be a licensed and practicing physician, giving exact date of vaccination, type or dose of vaccination, and reaction. The certificate must show an acceptable vaccination within seven days. "Counteraction observed" will not be recognized as acceptable vaccine. Certificates will be returned on request.

Non-compliance with these regulations will result in a fine of ten dollars when four weeks, and cancellation of registration when four weeks have passed from the day of registration. Unavoidable delays in meeting these requirements will not exempt anyone from the penalty.

TO THE PHYSICIAN:

In order to determine more accurately the result of the vaccination, the use of a control certificate is recommended for comparison with the reaction. In order to be accepted the result must support the result of the vaccination in the sense of one of the three groups noted below.

(1) **VACCINIA (primary reaction)—Appearance of pox on third or fourth day followed by the typical vesiculation, crusting, pustule formation, and crusting, which is usually caused by the vaccine itself.**

(2) **VACCINOID REACTION (secondary reaction or accelerated reaction)—This is most often obtained in individuals who have been previously vaccinated or who have had measles. The reaction is less severe and is more prolonged but passes through the stages noted above. The most severe reaction being reached between the fourth and sixth day after vaccination.**

(3) **IMMUNE REACTION (immediate reaction)—This reaction is seen when the individual has had measles or has been successfully vaccinated and has a high degree of immunity. The onset of reaction will be within a few hours after vaccination, resulting in moderate discomfort in four to five to eight hours after vaccination. The need for an early consideration of the vaccination is obvious.**

If there is no reaction, or if the reaction fails to correspond to any of the three types reaction above, it must be considered that the vaccine is impure or that the technique was faulty, and the vaccination must be repeated until an acceptable reaction is obtained.
