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An unusual success story unfolded when I visited the Judge family of Salsburg Road last week. The first Judge who has passed away died in India. Leaving his wife and two children, Judge's grandfather, Canadian-born, left his home in the Punjab and went to make a new life for himself. He first worked as a policeman in Hong Kong, then came to Canada where he worked as a bookkeeper in Victoria on the site of the present Woodward's store. Some years later, in 1925, he returned to India and brought his eleven-year-old son, Judge, to Victoria. After working at several banking firms, Judge persuaded his father to buy a farm.

Together they prospered and grew, purchasing their first dairy herd on Indian Island near the spot where the Chukar T.V. station used to be.

Judge continued and brought his wife Shanti to the farm. She bore him three sons and four daughters, all who helped in the family business. In 1940 they moved to a larger farm on West Salsburg Road and moved again in 1950 to Burnside Road. By 1970 the Judge family had purchased their first prize bull, Indus, a cow named Kori and a bull named Kori.
