Note re: Full view of things that terms "invasion" John Chinaman, coolie labour/ idea of massive immigration "pig tails"

12. after the war the situation became a force again, (1914-1918)

13. admission means value of the Japanese after the war.

14. was 3 in the 1901 census, but 4074 in 1903

NOTE: 15. Joseph Chamberlain, Sec. Colonial Sec. retires, 1900 suggested that B.C. apply a European literacy law to control immigration, as per Royal Commission on C and J, 1906, p376.

16-17. massive 1906-7 Japanese immigration. 18. "the wily Japanese". this result of B.C. immigration restrictions.

1908 (86) government's agreement restricted 2 to 400/yr.

19. British immigration stopped "in their own interest"

19. 1902-5 136 Hindus 30 women, 30 children.
1906-10, 1907-10 immigrants, about one-half women.

20. re: toleration of the "Chinaman" for all his failed hardiness, is not immune to the inevitable temper."

21. re: the "fortunate score of 1927" the Hindus were not considered significant.

1911- 1922, 1923-1931, 1932-1933.

22. re: anti immigration differentials --2.

192 considers now well established--and has weekly.

193 Hindu characteristics. integrity, thrift, patriotism, spirit of universalism.
