Sir,

Referring to the case of the Hindu H. Rahim, I beg to state that this matter came up before Mr Justice Gregory and a Jury at the assizes, on the 1st Inst. The accused pleaded "not guilty" to the charge, and his lawyer, Mr W. E. MacCloskey, raised a very ingenious defense, of the two indictments that were returned by the Grand Jury against Rahim, to wit, first, that of having his name placed on the Voters list, being a Hindu, and the second, that of voting in the election, the second was quashed while the Judge upheld the first, and in this case the matter went to trial.

In McElroy's contention was that the Act reads "No Hindu shall have his name placed on the Voters list" and there was no direct evidence to prove that Rahim ever did this, but it was at the same time pointed out by the Prosecuting Counsel that it is impossible for any Hindu to place his name on the Voters list himself and it must be done through the regular council and this had been done in the present case inasmuch as Rahim had signed a declaration which evidently had been given to before Mr W.E. MacCloskey, and as this declaration had evidently reached the Registrar of Voters and by him on the 1st of November last, when he put on a card of service, placed and placed on the Voters list completed
