Vancouver, B.C. 22nd February 1914.

Sir,

Since my return to this city on the 12th inst I have been, with  
extreme satisfaction, to hear that the agitation for the admission  
of their views in general has nearly died out, except among the few  
prominent men who are still showing the same with the hope that they  
may catch good in the eyes of their people and show some sort for the  
sum of \$100,000 spent in handling the immigration to Canada. The  
majority of those among this city have lost faith in the wanted  
men and there is a movement on foot to have them out of  
the dominion of the Empire and other territories under themselves.

From the present standpoint among the Hindus and others and the  
views of the people's private opinion and opinion. It is stated that  
as far back as 1908 when Teja Singh first appeared in Vancouver, the  
community were given an understanding in the form of a document signed  
by some sixty or seventy Hindus, that so long as Teja Singh was in Vancouver  
as far as the Hindus in Canada, there shall be no attempt to remove  
him from their midst, provided also, to return for his work as leader  
of the community. This guarantee has not been trying to remove
