Sir,

I regret to have to inform you that Suren M. Bose is at present in the city, after having been turned back from the White Rock point he returned again about a couple of hours after on another incoming train, hoping that by that time Justice had been successful in his application for a writ of habeas corpus and the officer at White Rock served with the papers. None was again sent back by the next train available. Justice had in the meantime through his solicitors, Messrs. McDowell & Horner, been able to secure a writ against Mr. Macmillan, but as he did not nor ever had Bose in his custody, he was unable to produce him before the Court on Friday the day fixed for the hearing.

Bose on his return to Seattle evidently went to the U.S. Immigration Office and there secured a letter of identification and the night following managed to board the steamer for Vancouver. Mr. Auld, our officer in Seattle, who checks the boat at that point had unfortunately not received the rejection warrant sent out from White Rock, and on the boat on arrival here is not checked up, he secured a landing on Saturday the 1st inst.

The defense corpus application was adjourned to Monday pending the examination of Mr. McDowell & myself on our affidavits.
