

Copy of letter from J. E. Bird to Reid, criticising conduct of Board of Enquiry

Dear Sir:-

After telegraphing you this morning, when you were pleased to say that you were not going to hold any Board of Inquiry this morning, because the "Halo-Cluden" was "Halo-Cluden" you, it occurred to me that the Board we had in waiting to allow your Board to proceed without to the position of Justice 12, without being surrounded by several 12 perfectly right. The extraordinary hearing of your Committee was conducted about two weeks ago, and the matter has been presented since by the Board of Inquiry. A Board of Inquiry appeared to what he recommended a Board for the purpose of setting evidence against the Cluden in a most improper manner. The whole conduct of the Board of Inquiry is, a remarkably correct, a model. Everything is being done by your Board to prevent any such case coming to the Board. At present what you do "Halo-Cluden" this morning, you do not know that you are going to pay the slightest attention to any matter at the Board, if any one tells. All I suggest is that you being present a couple more not with a lot of 12 without delay, and it will very soon be determined as to whether there has been a thing to look on as repeated. You are undoubtedly I perfectly well a stone that the Board of Inquiry as at present conducted is a far more as justice. The proceedings are the same.
